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## FADE IN:

1. A wide open ocean scene, no land in sight, waves rolling into froth and breakers.

**ORIGINAL MUSIC** and **SFX** here and throughout production created by Music and Sound Designers, scored to match the mood and pacing of the images

**NARRATOR:** (VOICE OVER)

**ACROSS OCEANS** 

THEY SAILED ...

2. Superimposed over a scene of waves is an illustration of stars and constellations.

NAVIGATING BY STARS ...

3. Superimposed over a scene of waves is an illustration of a ship with billowing sails from one of the maps.

PROPELLED BY WIND.

EXPLORERS, ON A QUEST.

4. Waves crash wildly against steep rocky headlands.

**BRAVING ROCKY SHORES** 

AND UNCHARTED SEAS ...

5. A wide shot of frothy ocean waves.

#### **MUSIC UP**

6. Over the scene of waves, a fancy cartouche "frame" from one of the maps is superimposed. The illustration in the center of the cartouche is replaced with the words of the Title, in a style similar to the artwork:

7. A single wave rolls and crashes.

8. A painting of a northwest landscape, a valley surrounded by high mountains.

12. An Atlas example of Ortelius' map of the world.

13. A recreated illustration of Ptolemy using a sextant.

14. Zooming out to the full map from an illustration of a ship on Munster's map.

15. Mis-shapen continents are obvious on the Munster map.

18. An illustration of headless natives with faces drawn on their chests.

19. A wave comes and washes over a sandy beach, and as the wave sweeps back out, a map is revealed.

20. An illustration of a Conquistador is superimposed over a map illustrating Quivira.

FROM THE ACCOUNTS

OF THE SPANISH

CONQUISTADORS

CAME THE LEGEND OF

QUIVIRA ...

#### ...A KINGDOM OF GOLD.

21. The camera sweeps across the gorgeous maps to focus on Quivira, in a different locale in each.

For example:

- a) Seile, 1652. Quivira is just south of Terra Borealis.
- b) Didier, 1772. Quivira is in Mexicana.
- c) Ortelius, 1575. Quivira is just north of Mar de Bachu.

IT APPEARED ON

MANY MAPS,

THOUGH NEVER IN THE

SAME LOCATION.

22. Illustrations of the ships on the maps accompany close looks at the mythical Strait of Anian.

For example:

- a) Ortelius, 1575. Stretto Di Anian is a north-south passage north of Japan.
- b) Didier, 1772. Estreto de Anian is a north-south passage near the Arctic.
- c) Schenk, 1706. (My copy of map too small to see exactly where located.)

IN THE 1200s,

23. An ocean scene of waves breaking against headlands in a wild fury.

**SEGUE: MUSIC UNDER AND UP** 

FIERCE NOR'WESTERS

AND TREACHEROUS

**HEADLANDS PREVENTED** 

**EXPLORERS FROM** 

**ACCURATELY CHARTING** 

THE NORTHWEST COAST.

24. Closeups of the words "Terra Incognito" in the area of the Pacific Northwest.

MUCH OF IT WAS SIMPLY

LABELED "TERRA

INCOGNITA," OR,

"UNKNOWN LAND."

25. A melange of the maps commissioned by royalty, with images from the maps that come forward in a 3-D fashion -- like the ornate legends, trumpets, crowns and shields. Some of the calligraphic words may float over the maps, like "For the Earl of Bershire" (Senex, 1721) and "Carte D'Amerique Dressier pour l'usage Du Roy" (Map of America for the Use of the King). Perhaps paintings of royalty can be interwoven as well.

26. The camera sweeps across the maps with distinct colored borders.

For example:

Schenk, 1706

L'Isle, 1739

Nolin, 1742

EXPLORERS FROM RUSSIA,

FRANCE,

SPAIN,

ENGLAND,

AND AMERICA ...

... SOUGHT CONTROL OF

THE NORTHWEST.

27. The camera moves in on closeups of outlandish things still on maps.

For example:

Frectum Anian (Schenk, 1706)

New Albion, (Sayer, 1786)

Straits of de Fonte (Roberts, 1794)

Fousang des Chinois (Didier, 1772, Sayer, 1786, Roberts, 1794)

Quivira (Senex, 1721, L'Isle 1739) The Great Lake of Thorago (Senex, 1721)

DESPITE THE NEED FOR

GREATER PRECISION,

MAPS WERE STILL

WOEFULLY INACCURATE.

28. Camera moves on blank continental areas of maps. Words indicating the unknown can sweep across the screen, like "Incognita" (Visscher, 1670) and "Regione Incognite" (Ortelius, 1575).

SPAIN'S POLICY WAS TO

HIDE ALL DISCOVERIES --

EVEN FROM OTHER

SPANISH EXPLORERS.

29. We can create something stylistically to indicate map-drawing, especially if we design a scenario as mentioned earlier with pens, brushes and other early mapmaking tools. Maps that are directly relevant to this statement include Hondius, 1606 (he was one of three known mapmakers from Drake's original "Queen's Map.") London mapmakers from the OHS collection are Senex, Jeffreys, Sayer, and Roberts.
