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FADE IN:

A COMPLEX AND ARTFUL LAYERING OF IMAGES FROM STEINBECK'S LIFE AND WORK THAT ILLUSTRATE THE THEMES OF THE TITLE

For example:

- 1. Begin with an extreme closeup of the curves of letters and pull back to reveal a page of manuscript.
- 2. Perhaps an anemone moving its tentacles in turquoise waters -- a film poster for "The Wayward Bus" -- gardening tools -- the book cover of "Cup of Gold" -- animation of hunters from "Travels with Charley."

NARRATOR: (voiceover) (possibly Gary Sinese)

"I'm afraid I will have to build a whole new kind of expression for it. And maybe go nuts doing it."

3. Perhaps: Black/white photo of Dust Bowl migrants -- royalty in tiaras and tuxedos dining in an elegant ballroom -- sharpened pencil points -- the screenplay for "Viva Zapata!" -- a frog with its neck bulging as it croaks.

"It's not taking it easy that matters, but taking it right and true."

4. Perhaps: A temple in Israel -- a film poster for "The Moon is Down" -- mariachis playing in a Mexican zocalo -- farmers working in a French vineyard -- Russians walking past the Kremlin.

5. Perhaps: The playbook from "Of Mice and Men" -- a field of wild California poppies -- the book cover of "Tortilla Flat" -- John's dog Jiggs -- an early manuscript written in a bookkeeping ledger.
