a) A wide shot, from an overlook, showing a panoramic expanse of hoodoos.

NARRATOR: (voiceover)

BRYCE CANYON IS 120 MILES

NORTHWEST OF MONUMENT

VALLEY, IN SOUTH CENTRAL

UTAH.

b) Long, slow pan across an expanse of hoodoos.

WHEN THE PAIUTES FIRST

VIEWED THESE FANTASTIC

HOODOOS, IT WAS WITH A

SENSE OF REVERENCE.

THEY CALLED THEM "UNKA-

TIMPE-WA-WINCE-POCK-ICH"

... WHICH MEANS, LITERALLY,

"RED ROCKS STANDING LIKE MEN IN A BOWL-SHAPED

RECESS."

c) From down in the canyon, looking up at the hoodoos.

SFX: Drumming <u>UP AND UNDER</u>

11. BRYCE IN WINTER

- a) An expanse of hoodoos, like the Silent City.
- b) A different shot of an expanse of hoodoos.
- c) A time lapse of one section with shadows overtaking the scene.

GRAVEL.

- d) Closeup of dried landscape.
- e) Closeup of compressed rock.
- f) Closeup of hardened rock

OVER EONS, THE ONCE-HUGE

- a) Beauty shot of the famous bristlecone pine, at the edge of the cliff.
- b) Closeup of branches moving in the wind

MILLIONS OF YEARS AFTER

THE HOODOOS WERE

FORMED, THIS BRISTLECONE

PINE SPROUTED ...

... AT THE SOUTHERNMOST

END OF BRYCE CANYON, ON

ONE OF ITS MOST EXPOSED,

WINDSWEPT CLIFFS.

c) Shots moving around the tree and closeups of its bark.

BRISTLECONES ARE BELIEVED

15. EBENEZER BRYCE

- a) Background scene of the canyon, with simple patterns but rich colors.
- b) SUPERIMPOSE in layers of montages old photographs of Ebenezer and Mary, an old ranch, cows and sheep.

THE NAME "BRYCE" OF BRYCE

CANYON ORIGINATED IN

THE LATE 1800s.

THE SCOTTISH EMIGRANT

EBENEZER BRYCE AND HIS

WIFE MARY MOVED TO THIS

REMOTE SOUTHERN UTAH

VALLEY TO RAISE SHEEP AND CATTLE, AND HAUL TIMBER.

PEOPLE STARTED CALLING
THE PLACE AT THE END OF
HIS TIMBER ROAD, "BRYCE'S
CANYON," AND THE NAME
STUCK.

BRYCE DIDN'T STICK

AROUND FOR LONG,

THOUGH. FIVE YEARS LATER,

HE LEFT FOR ARIZONA.

EBENEZER'S COMPLAINT? HE

TOLD EVERYONE, "IT'S A

HELL OF A PLACE TO LOSE A

COW!"

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
